Esther, a young Hebrew woman, was used of God to save her people from devastating genocide. She lived out her destiny – her purpose in life.

And you? Do you plod through life, hoping to make it to the weekend? Or do you live with intentionality, aiming to fulfill a divinely given mission?

According to the Bible, each one of us possesses a heavenly mission to serve God and advance His kingdom on earth. He has fashioned us purposefully to contribute to his cosmic plan of redemption in a unique way. Our part is to discover that loving intention, and live it out!

One must "Declare the Vision" in order to "run with it"

Then the LORD replied:
"Write down the revelation
and make it plain on tablets
so that a herald^[a] may run with it. Habakkuk 2:2

Jesus articulated his mission clearly and boldly!

¹⁶ He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. He stood up to read, ¹⁷ and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.
 He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free,



19 to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."[a] Luke 4:16-20

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Part I – The vital importance of a life mission.

- 1. Keeps us on track it keep us from detours and major missteps in our life planning
- 2. Reminds us of our holy "duty" to serve God
- 3. Motivates us to bear afflictions and make sacrifices

1. Having a Mission Keeps us on track – it keeps us from detours and major missteps in life planning

Jesus needed to resist strong and pressing distractions

Urgent demands of circumstances and those around us can easily derail us in fulfilling our life mission. Consider the example of Jesus...

- ³⁵ Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed. ³⁶ Simon and his companions went to look for him, ³⁷ and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!"
- ³⁸ Jesus replied, "Let us go somewhere else—to the nearby villages—so I can preach there also. That is why I have come." ³⁹ So he traveled throughout Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons. Mark 1:35-39

Because he kept his mission foremost in his mind through prayer and reflection, he was able to say "no" to the demands of those around him, however well-intentioned they may have been. According to this text, what was the mission Jesus needed to fulfill. What was the demand he needed to resist? How could this have been difficult?

John knew his identity and his place – which kept him from a major error!

John the Baptist – "a man sent from God..." (Juan 1:6)

¹⁹ Now this was John's testimony when the Jewish leaders^[a] in Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. ²⁰ He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely,

"I am not the Messiah."



They asked him, "Then who are you? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No." Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. Who you say about yourself?" John replied in the words of Isaiah the prophet, "I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way for the Lord.'" Juan 1:19-23

²⁴ However, I consider my life worth nothing to me; my only aim is to finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me—the task of testifying to the good news of God's grace. Acts 20:24

Our mission keeps our "eyes on the prize"

²⁴ Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. ²⁵ Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. ²⁶ Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. ²⁷ No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize. 1 Cor. 9:24-27

Paul compares himself to an athlete that longs to win the gold. Such an athlete must discipline him or herself and train rigorously to stay in shape and remain competitive. 4. Knowing our Mission give us the hope of ultimate joy

We are "fashioned" to fulfill a specific and unique purpose


We are each *fashioned* to fulfill a distinct mission in our own, unique way. As in the case of fingerprints, we all seem similar, *but none is exactly alike!* You are unique, and your calling is unique.

Every one is called to...

- Love God and others -- ¡In our own way!

 Through our own temperament and personality!
- Live in holiness In our own way!

 At our workplace, in our family and in our community!





We are members of one body, but with a distinct shape (1 Corinthians 12)

God has molded us to serve in a special way. We are "members" of the "body of Christ."

A body contains a multiplicity of organs and members

Some are public and visible in nature

While others are hidden and private

Some are soft in texture



While others are hard.

How can I discover my mission?

Discovering one's mission is a life-long process. Discipleship Level IV focuses extensively on the process of identifying and developing our spiritual gifts. But we begin the process of discovery using some simple questions to provoke reflection.

Features of a Mission Statement

- It should dream of the stars: Some dreams are God-given. By faith, we "call things that are not, as though they were." Many times we write down that which seems unattainable, only to return to these words years later, praising God for his ability to make our dreams come true.
- It should have feet on the ground: While we want to exercise faith and vision, this statement should be rooted to some extent in your present reality. There exists a line between faith and fantasy.
- It should become increasingly specific over the years: An initial mission statement may be general in nature, but over the years it should become increasingly refined and specific.
- *It should be "summarize-able"* A Mission that cannot be remembered is less useful in daily living than one which can be repeated, almost as a slogan.

For example, consider the following famous "mission statements"

- o "Bringing happiness to millions" Disney
- o "Exceptional care without exception" Boston Medical Center
- o "Follow without holding anything back" (Lyrics from a song)
- o "Crossing barriers to impact lives for Christ" a missionary pastor
- o "Transforming lives Transforming the City" An urban church
- o "A worshiper of God and a deliverer of men" Mike Bickle
